

What Are Pre-Employment Transition Services (Pre-ETS)?

Pre-ETS are **free**, individualized services that focus on **career exploration** and **work experience** for students **with a documented disability ages 14-22**. They can be provided individually to a student or in small groups.

Workplace Readiness Training

Teaches common job skills like filling out applications, managing money, and getting to work, sometimes referred to as "soft skills."

Instruction in Self-Advocacy

Helps students learn how to make decisions, set goals, and understand their rights, needs, and responsibilities.



Job Exploration Counseling

Activities to learn about career interests, job trends, and career paths.

Work-Based Learning Experiences

Provides hands-on job experiences in the community to build foundational career skills.

Counseling on Postsecondary Education Opportunities

Explores education options after high school, like college, trade schools, or apprenticeships.

Who provides Pre-ETS?

Adult Career and Continuing Education Services—Vocational Rehabilitation (ACCES-VR)

ACCES-VR is an agency outside of the school district that supports individuals with disabilities to find a job, keep their job, and live independently.

Vendors

Community-based providers, called vendors, are approved and contracted by ACCES-VR. Vendors work in partnership with the student, their family, the school, and any other agencies involved with the student to provide the identified Pre-ETS.

New York State Commission for the Blind (NYSCB)

For students who are legally blind, including those with additional disabilities, the NYSCB is the primary agency that provides Pre-ETS and vocational rehabilitation.

Where can Pre-ETS occur?

Pre-ETS can take place either in school, the community, or virtually.

They can occur during school (outside of required academic coursework), after school, on the weekends, or during school vacations/summer break.

How can Pre-ETS occur?

Students and families can coordinate schedule and location with the vendor and the school.

What are the two pathways to Pre-ETS?

What is the referral process?

How do I start the referral process?

Contact a teacher, counselor, or Committee on Special Education (CSE) chair and tell them you are interested in your student receiving Pre-ETS.

What paperwork do I need for the referral process?

Documentation of student's disability.

• Examples: IEP, 504 accommodations, school psychological or clinical evaluation, social security beneficiary award letter.

Once the school submits the referral, what happens?

A local vendor or ACCES-VR Counselor will contact you to explain the next steps in the process and work with you to identify which Pre-ETS the student may benefit from.

Once services are established for the child, how are Pre-ETS reflected in the IEP?

Pre-ETS should be included in the Coordinated Set of Transition Activities, as they support effective transition planning by helping students identify their strengths and develop employment and self-determination skills.
